

had some very severe disappointments, and that was one of them.

I felt Dr. Buswell did a tremendous thing for Wheaton. He tripled its size, he greatly increased its endowments, got new money for them and all that, but other men have done that too. I mean anybody who does that for a college shows himself to be a man of real ability. Dr. Buswell did what I don't know that anybody else has done: taken a Christian college and tripped its size, and greatly increased its money, and without having it lose its Christian Character! That was a tough struggle to do it. He interviewed people very very carefully. It was an interdenominational college and he got people from many different denominational backgrounds, but he was very strict on their loyalty to the Scripture and to its great fundamental doctrines and their willingness to stand by the standards of conduct Wheaton was very strict on at that time. He gave considerable freedom in other matters.

He told me how one man had talked to him, wanted a position there and he said he had no question he supported the doctrinal stand right down the line. He was thoroughly in accord with their standard of conduct; there was absolutely no problem. Well, he said, I got a bit suspicious because he said, Nearly everybody who comes has some problem with something in the doctrinal statement or something we have to discuss and see whether his variation is far enough to make a problem or not. This man had absolutely nothing. So he said, I said to him, Have you had any great change in your views lately and in your attitudes? Oh, no, this is what I've always believed. So he said, he wrote to the place where the man had formerly taught and found that there had not been the slightest evidence there that he held the views that he claimed to hold. It just shows how he --- it's not an easy thing.
