registrar and librarian one year and then had been simply librarian the last year and had taken graduate work with me and taken the STM. A very able fellow, and he was a very great asset to us.

Then we got A. W. Eppard who had had a year at Edinburgh. A graduate of Westminster. Very very nice fellow. A marvellous memory, but a very poor teacher. He came with us and he certainly knew the NT material. So we his classes were very valuable in criticism particularly. When it came to exegesis he was well I don't know. There was a lot of criticism from his students about his exegesis. So we largely put him into criticism and had others take the exegesis. But that first year I worked awfully hard. I did a lot of teaching, and of course Harris did work. Eppard did. Then we looked around for someone else and we got a man who was a retired missionary to India who had been active in the Presbyterian Church of America and come out when we did. A very fine fellow, and he gave some lovely talks in chapel, but he was just not strong enough. So after two or three weeks he came to me and said, I just can't do it. So we looked around, and Francis Schaeffer wrote a letter about his father-in-law. He described his father-in-law, and told about his missionary activity and his work and was anxious we should get him. We got Dr. Seville, who was not a particularly good teacher, but he was a very godly man. He had to been a missionary in China for many many years ago. He died 2 years ago at the age of 101. Spiritually he was a real asset to the seminary.

Funny thing. Dr. Seville gave marvelous talks in chapel if you listened closely. His delivery was most monotonous, quiet and just talked along and did not get much out of it. So I gave a class in public speaking elective, and had them read some prest poetry and put emphasis in and all that. I asked R Dr. Seveille to sit in with the class. He sat in with the class and I gave him one of these dramatic poems to read and he did it marvelously. He let himself loose and really he was excellent. I said Dr. Seville if you would let yourself loose like that you would be. He was in the
