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so disgusted with him that they didn't want a president. So the 8 yrs. at Westminster we had a chairman of the faculty, we did not have a president.

So it fits quite naturally that he would say, Wd don't want a president; we'll have you be chairman of the faculty. They used that term on me for years afterward. It was late in the first year when we had a speaker who as he came out after the meeting, he said to me, Who is the Presidenthere? I said, I'm Chairman of the faculty. I could see by the expression on his face that I might as well have said, I'm the janitor! It meant absolutely nothing to him.

Then that next summer Dr. Buswell tried to better to go to Wheaton to join their faculty, and Dr. McIntire accused === was very much afraid he would loose me, and I mentioned to him how there was this -- there was no prestiget to the title Chirman of the faculty at all. And how there was certain little difficulty to it. Oh, he said, I would not object to your being President, not at all, he said. We'll make you president.

So me made the motion in the Board that I be given the title of President of the faculty or president of the seminary. That was the way he worded it. In many schools, previous to that time, I think in many schools that they had a president of the board and a president of the faculty, but the president of the faculty was the president of the institution. So that that was the action that was passed.

But he kept calling me chairman of the faculty, or at least president of the faculty for years. Only when they founded the XDDD ACCC and he wanted to show what prominent people they had in it, so in the article about that he called mepresident of Faith Seminary.

I think it was about 2/3 of the way through that second year, that he -- somebody -- I believe that it seems to me I met him somewhere and he said, You are calling yourself president; that's not fair to me. Something like that he said. Then I got a note from him written in hisown hand (ow writing) in which he said people were referring to me as president of the seminary, and I was permitting that to be done, and it wasn't right! Well, I knew that was in the motion he'd passed.

So I just wrote him a note and said, I got your note. I said, I can assure you I have not used any title that has not been voted in the board. That's all I said. But he was quite fussy, you see, on that point. And in the Board I used to notice -- he has almost an hypnotic personality. He stood for something, and you would present an idea and he'd say, Why that's impossible! It just stands to reason!! Well, everybody knows it stands to reason. I've seen people come into that Board meeting who in their actions would be-- on a comparatively minor point you might say-- would be the exact opposite of what he would think they should do.
