We-that is, / seems to be no question-I think we can give a 10 to this -- that when the dead in Christ who have been resurrected are lifted up from this earth to the clouds the living in Christ are lifted, those who have not died, are lifted up from this earth at the same time, that this is a simultaneous occurrence, but whether this simultaneous occurrence occurs immediately after the dead come out of the graves or whether for ten years they sit by the graves and wait for this next is something which the passage doesn't state. (Student) I would say the obvious interpretation then, the immediate interpretation is the two occur as one event. You might give that a seven or an eight, or could you give it a 10?
