no man dwells, neither doth any son of man pass thereby."

Now, how did Jeremiah know that this would happen in Mesopotamia and not in Palestine or in Egypt? How could he know that the river would change its course hundreds of years after he wrote these words? There was a Knowledge back of Jeremiah enabling him to make this specific statement which would exactly describe what came to pass.

Now, let us turn over to the book of Ezekiel, and in the book of Ezekiel let us see some statements about the land of Egypt. Ezek. 30: 13-16. I want to call your attention here to some statements about two cities, and of these statements about theme two cities I want to ask the question. Suppose they were reversed, - is it like the Greek predictions I called attention to, or like the Sibylline books at Rome, or would you say this prediction was fulfilled if things had happened the opposite to what did happen? The two cities I want to speak of, one of them is called Memphis, and it is so called in the Revised Version. The authorized version transliterates the Hebrew exactly, "Noph". Menopher is the ancient name of Memphis, and it is often abbreviated "Noph". I am going to say Memphis, to make it simpler, as the Revised Version does. The other city is called "No". "No" means THE city, and it is used in the Assyrian records as a specific name for the city of Thebes. There is no question as to the identity of these; it is too bad that in the Authorized Version it does not call them by the name by which we know them, - Memphis and Thebes, instead of "No" and "Noph". I will substitute those words as I read it.

Verse 13: "Thus saith the Lord God. I will also destroy the idols and I will cause their images to cease out of Memphis. And there shall be no more a prince in the land of Egypt; and I will put a fear in the
