

representative of the Lucianic text, since all the Lucianic Mss. have the form ^ἑἑλλῆς elsewhere, instead of ἑλλῆς, which these two mss. (along with the other Greek mss.) have here.

v.12. B (here not followed by [ⓔ]), N, 2 Lucianic mss. (again 82 and 93-- another evidence, acc. to Rahlfs, of their superiority), and ^{one} other cursive differ with all the other Greek evidence and with the Hebrew by omitting any translation of [ⓔ] [ⓓ] puts its translation of these words sub.ast. and refers their origin to Aquila and Theodotion.

v.13. Here [ⓔ] [ⓓ] is written twice instead of only once, as in v.4.

On the matter of the one or two caves, the division is similar to that in v.4, but not identical. B A N [ⓔ] [ⓓ] and three cursives use the singular. 82,93,127, i, and two other cursives specify two caves, while all the other cursives, including 19 and 108 use the plural but do not mention the number two, as they did in v.4. [ⓓ] [ⓔ] [ⓓ] is very evidently the original Lucianic reading, and another point (this one not mentioned by Rahlfs) must be chalked up for 82,93 against 19,108.
