

and of training men to present the Bible as the inerrant Word of God. What a shock it was, less than a year ago, to learn that the leading professor in this institution had written a book, called "The Case for Orthodox Theology," of which the recent review in the Moody Monthly correctly said that its "presentation in many respects is actually the case against historic orthodoxy rather than for it." In addition, the book is full of sneering and raging against Fundamentalists, who stand by the Word of God. Sad as it is to see such a book coming from such a source, it is sadder still to see the institution defending the man and the book, instead of being anxious to repudiate it and to declare its opposition to the views that it contains. Seldom in the past has an institution changed its direction as rapidly as would seem to be evidenced by this. It shows how great is the need of constant vigilance, lest the work of God be undermined. Truly the Christian Beacon rendered a needed service in calling attention earlier than most other periodicals to the wicked nature of this ungodly book.

Ecclesiastical Tyranny

A second trend against which a Watchman is greatly needed is the growth of ecclesiastical tyranny. Rank and file members of the churches have little conception how far this trend has gone. It is a subtle grasping force that threatens to wipe out Christian faith.
