the Christian is constantly to watch, because he does not know when his Lord may come, would have no meaning for an unbeliever. The exhortation to be faithful and always to be ready, because the time of the Lord's coming is unknown, are addressed to believers in Christ, and represent this very important fourth motive for active and faithful Christian service.

In conclusion, the teaching of this important lesson may be summed up in three statements: 1. It is absolutely certain that Christ will return in power and great glory; 2. No man knows when that glorious event will take place; 5. The Christian should seek always to be ready, so that he may be found serving faithfully whenever his Lord may come.
