said it's worth taking the effort to get the proper method of interpretation, it's worth going into these things, and studying them and finding out what they mean, he says, O fools and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken. Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to enter into his glory. And how many of us, when we meet him and we say O Lord I couldn't understand, this happened in my life, I just couldn't understand, why did this happen, why did this work way. He' il say, O fools and slow of heart to believe all the prophets have spoken. The principles are all laid fout there in the Bible, it's gone into there, it's presented, it is plain. You have to dig to get it, you have to work to get it, you have to look to the Holy Spirit to lead you to get it, but it's there and I put it there on purpose so you could have it, and could study it and could understand it...

at that time, an attitude that this group of books that the Jews of that day accepted as the inspired Word of God, reliable and authoritative was indeed God's revelation, and the Christian's attitude toward the Bible is that the entire Bible, the 66 books, make up God's revelation to us, God's communication to us, the Bible is the revelation of God.

Now we will give later, further evidences of the fact that the Bible is dependable, that ew we can trust it, as being God's revelation. We will examine a little of the evidence of how these various books came together, how we come to know that these are the rightful, these are the books which are thus God's revelation to us, but right now I want to take you into a little different theme.
