2. Get started. A great part of accomplishment is getting started. Writers, they say, will sometimes sit in front of their typewriters for several hours wondering what to write. They hesitate so much that it has become a standard statement among writers, that half the job is getting started. Half the job is sitting down and writing and saying something, and getting underway. That is true of most activities. We spend too much time hesitating and wondering. God wants us to get started, and move ahead.

3. Utilize the moments. Paul said to the Colossians and also to the Ephesians that they should redeem the time. Time slips by, it disappears. It's gone! Where did it go? You don't know. You spend a little time doing this, you enjoy this for a little. You've chatted about this for a while, and time has gone. The opportunity is lost. God wants you to utilize the moments.

There was a man who had great ability as a singer, and he decided to become an opera singer. He was told that if he would put in 5 yrs. of hard work he might be able to become an opera singer. This man said, I am going with this two years. I am going to be an opera singer within two years. He utilized every ^{moment} moment. He told me when he was waiting for a train somewhere he was exercising his vocal chords. He was thinking over various truths. He was working on it. All this time he put in working, preparing, pushing ahead. And in two years he accomplished what takes most people 5 yrs. to accomplish. There's no sense lolling over Greek and Hebrew and getting a little bit done. When you are waiting for a car or train, sitting in an office or driving, go over your Greek forms. Go over
