Well a little of the experience we tried to get him to get would have put him in a position to be far better equipped for it than listening to a lot of lectures about it. We don't give a lot of courses in methods. We have all we can do to really learn to interpret the Bible in 3 yrs., and that's a fundamental thing for anyone who is going to serve the Lord. We try to do everything we can in other things, but this is a major thing that we have got to put our great stress on, in learning to interpret the Bible. That's a major thing for the one who is truly to serve the Lord. But in all aspects of work, and in all types of things, I'd say a young person should try to improve himself because there is no sort of thing in which any one of us cannot acquire a minimal amount of ability, and no one knows when that minimal amount of ability may prove tremendously important in accomplishing the Lord's work. So if we are to get the Lord's commendation it is vital that we work hard and make our energies count. But it is also vital that we try to develop ourselves in every regard to some extent. I believe this is very vital. As you get older, you reach the point where you say, Now this is my field, these other things, I'll let somebody else do. But I don't think that one as a young person should take that attitude. I think he should learn to do a certain amount in every area of life or Christian work. You never know when it may come in handy, and be vital. But I don't think that that in that regard. I think
