They keep their children's memory alive of what their houses used to be like; where they used to live, and how they had free reign over this whole land. It was their land they think, and you can imagine how they feel.

What is the solution? Will signing a paper make a solution? Will it bring peace and security to the Jews? They talk about the rights of the Palestinians. Will it give Palestinians the right of displacing the Jews? The right of taking back the land they have held
