necessarily covered in the sentence. From every sentence we can derive certain ideas with definite certainty, and there are many other matters that we might ask about and we might, if we read the sentence superficially, think it deals with, but that actually it doesn't or that we can only infer from it. Thus, if I said that I traveled I made a trip to Europe last summer, someone might say, "Well, of course he flew; that's the quick way to get to Europe." Someone else would say, "No, he must have taken a ship because that would be a much more pleasant way, and he always enjoys traveling by ship." [do any ships run anymore other than occasional trips by the Q E II?] The mere statement that I made a trip to Europe would involve a true fact but it would not cover many questions that could be asked to which the sentence the second secon gave no answer.
