I have taken for my subject this morning the Duty of the Christian in relation to the coming election. The question might be asked, Why should the Christian be bothered about the election? After all our citizenship is in heaven from whence we look for the Saviour. Alas, some people are scheavenly minded they are no earthly good. God wants us to be both to be heavenly minded and good for something on this earth. I believe that the coming election for the Christian is a time of great crisis. I believe there are three reasons why this election can be one of the most important that was ever held in this country.
