

The salary was always 6 months behind. Things would get way behind and then he'd make a drive for the seminary, and he's make a drive for something else he was interested in! I said to him in 1968, "Carl, I wish you'd make a list of all the things you are connected with--all 20 or so, and then cross out half of them. If you would do that, I don't care which ones you'd cross out, if you would do that you could do the others in a way that would last. As it is there are loose ends in every one of them." Oh he said, I've got another 20 yrs."

Well, he's still going strong after 13, so maybe he will have another 20. But the thing is there are those loose ends. He's lost friends all through these years that were interested in the big things he stood for. But he's lost them through these attitudes. Back there in 1969 there was a man who had legal training. He came to the seminary as a student. He told someone about it later that he came in order to reform the school. I didn't know anything about that till he's been there over two years. That's what he told them.

He began watching what everybody said in order to see whether we were following exactly as Dr. McIntire wanted. He broke with him 5 yrs. after that! But that was his attitude. He went to Mr. Dunzweiler's class. He began writing down statements of Mr. Dunzweiler. Then the next day he spoke up in class, You said this; what did you mean by this? etc. Disrupted the class!

I said, You can't do that. He said, I'm going to appeal this to higher authority. He started going over to him and telling him things like that. Copying sentences out of context.

Other details were worked it. But it was the same thing. I left Westminster because they were taking an attitude instead of putting the Bible primary, the attitude was here's this system of 1000 doctrines. You've got to be exactly along the line or you are just out! Well now he was taking the same attitude in a different way. It was you must take this stand in ecclesiastical things right down the line just whatever way I think. Of course he's lost an awful lot of friends by that and he's just been doing so many things he's had loose ends everywhere.

We were training some fine people but we would have had 50% more students if it wasn't for the way people were getting irritated with the way he was doing things. Of course we had to train all our own faculty because to bring in anybody from outside he would insist they be right in line with him. Whereas if it was from ours he knew they were generally in line and he would pretty much take my word for it, you see. So the result was that when this fellow began going and talking to him why he decided that I probably had served my usefulness. So he said to me (there's a lot of detail there I won't take time to mention) in Jan., he said, You ought to retire.

I said, There's nothing I'd like better than to retire and get my writing done. I'd like to do that. I've put all these years in the seminary and I'd like to know there is somebody
