He becomes very much excited and anxious to know what the , what is the meaning of the writing. He calls to all the , for all the wise men of Babylon, and gives a wonderful offer: "Whosoever shall read this writing and show me the interpretation thereof, shall be clothed in scarlet, shall have a chain of gold about his neck, and shall be the third ruler in the kingdom. " Then we read that all the wise men were brought in but none of them could read the writing. Eventually, the Queen heard of what was happening and came to the king and told him of a wise man who had been prominent in kBabylon during the reign of a previous king, Nebuchadnezzar, and suggests that this Daniel might be able to read the interpretation. Daniel is called in and the same offer is made to him as had been made to the wise man; "If thou canst read the writing and make known to me the interpretation thereof, thou shalt be clothed with scarlet and shall have a chain of gold about thy neck and shall be the third ruler in the kingdom." (verse 16) Daniel answer s and explains the meaning of the writing, which is that God is going to take away the kingdom from Belshazzar and give it to the Medes and the Persians.

Verse 29 is a most astonishing verse, because it shows the, what an honorable king Belshazzar must have been. Despite the very unpleasant nature of the interpretation which Daniel has given, he evidently recognizes it as being a correct interpretation and proceeds tomake, to carry out his promise. I do not imagine there are many rulers who would have been as honorable as this. We read in verse 29, then commanded Belshazzer and they clothed Daniel with scarlet and  $\psi$  put a chain of
