 7 to be dependable, requires very special

### 9 2. Prophecy Not Necessarily Prediction.

10 In line with the present common use of the word  
 11 prophecy, there are those who consider all pro-  
 12 phesy as simply prediction, and this brings con-  
 13 fusion into the understanding of the prophets.  
 14 In reaction against this approach other writers  
 15 have attempted to reduce the element of predic-  
 16 tion almost to nothing. Both errors should be  
 17 carefully avoided. Prediction has so important  
 18 a place in prophecy that its part will be speci-  
 19 fically discussed under C below, yet it should  
 20 be remembered that there is far more to prophecy  
 21 than merely prediction, and that many important  
 22 prophecies include little or no prediction.
