MacR: We certainly are looking forward to the Millennium in the passage, but are we right in the Millennium? Or is there a reference, an allusion of (5 1/2) and stress in periods prior to this?

stu: In that day, would that sketch the present age, in other words, when God preserves the remnant of his people and the gospel blessing goes out to the Gentiles,
