of the Holy Spirit had come more to the fore. And there were some who were ready to recognize that Jesus was fully God, but would not recognize the He Holy Spirit as trully divine. It was an influence of something set forth by God, which He created, or something which the Son had created. And at the Council, this denial of the deity of the Holy Spirit was particularly maintained by a man named Macedonias. So, the belief became to be known, the heresy of thex denying the deity of the Holy Spirit, came to be called Macedonianism. And the Council of Const. reaffirmed the Nicean Credd, but also made a statement, to make it include the ast statment, to make absolutely clear the fact that they believed in the diety of the Holy Spirit also, against Macedonianism. They had another explanation, attempted mxx explanation, which had been made of the feature of the Person of Christ, which they had to face, which was called Apolinarianism. They also denied. We will not discuss Apolinarianism at this point, we will come back to it later. It is the beginning of another movement, which is very important, this rise of Apolinariansim and its denial here. But we will not deal with it at the present point, but merely mention it.

This CouncilxESEEX, some councils before during the time of Constantius which would stand strongly for A innsim, would of course take a view which was definite heretical, but some who would appose Arianism would take a stand which would EXEXEXX move in the direction of Sibeliamism, a philosophy which would also be unacceptable. This council reaffirmed the excellent creed of the Nicean Council, with; a few minor changes, and the emperor ratified the creed of the Council and enacted the law that the churches, the property of the churches, should all be handed over to bishops NEMEX who believed in the equal divinity of the Father, Song, and Holy Spirit, and who stood in church fellowship with certain designated orthodox bishops.

The public worship of **MEREIXER** was heretics was to be forbidden in his domain, and this is the first time that we find the force **DEXRE** of the empire exerted against heretical beliefs in the Christian church. One of the prominenet writers of ch. hist. said how ofrtunate it is for the charch, that

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
