I don't know of any way to make 15 and 16 refer to Christ. This true sion of David is coming, you don't know when. Well, since you don't know when, assuming (6 1/2) if he should be born before he would reach this state, this would happen. Well, in that case, you're using a measuring stick to compare the life of a child, but no difference whether that child was Christ, or Napoleon, or anybody else, I mean it doesn't, there is no relation to Christ, and it certainly is not born to them, so I feel just about exactly that way, that it is a measuring stick which is being used (7) But it's more or less hypothetical. (stu) Well I would say it is the predicted one, if he should be born now,

using it for a time measurer. We're not saying he will be born now, but we haven't
