vexation, but at the first he lightly afflicted the land of Naphtali, and did more grievously afflict her by the way of the sea, beyond Jordan, in Galilèe of the nations.

Now the RV says: But there shall be no doom to her that was in anguish. In a former time he brought the land of Zebulon and the land of Naphtali, in the latter time hath he made it glorious.

One says made it glorious, the other says grievously afflict. The KJ and the ASV in the next verse sharply contradict each other, and yet both represent meanings which can be quite validly taken from the verse, and it's too bad we didn't get time to get on the next verse, but I think the principle that I have in mind we brought out fairly well in this length of time. There is a transition here, in which language is intentionally used to show a change, and we can't be sure just where the change takes place.
