

interpret this - I would say there are three ways of interpreting it. There is the pre-millennial. It is what is going to happen after the return of Christ. There is the post-millennial. There will be a millennium like that before Christ comes, to which we look forward to. And the A-millennial, it describes what we are in today, and have been ever since the first Adam. The millennium then is the period from the first coming of Christ to the second coming of Christ. Now does this describe this present period, then it is certainly extremely clear. (Student). In the Post-millennial view, it might be that we will soon learn to shoot up some new satellite which will do that. And on the ~~Post-~~ A-millennial view it is something that has already happened, Mr. Bentley. (Student). There are a good many who feel that way. And the way the people do who feel that way is to say, Isaiah 65 verse 17, is the New Heavens and the New Earth, after the millennium and then 18 to 25, jumps back to the millennium. Because I don't think there is anybody, who takes 18 to 25, as describing a period after the millennium. And that may be. Personally it doesn't seem particularly reasonable but it certainly is not impossible at all. (Student). Now this passage here, 18 through 25, with the partial rule of interpretation, - when would you say that happened. It would be pretty hard to put Isaiah 65:18-25, in a time after the thousand years. It would be very difficult to do. I never heard of it myself. Mr. Dunn. (Student.) You are probably referring to Revelation 21. And Rev. 21 begins with the words that I saw a new heaven and a new earth. Is He saying that He saw something after the great white throne judgement? Or is He looking back and seeing what happened during the Millennium? There are two interpretations and I know of no way to prove which is right. And then he goes on verse 4, God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes, and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither anymore pain, for the former things are passed away. Now that would seem to be talking about those from whose eyes, the Lord wipes away all tears. From them there will be no more death. It does not prove whether there is a very slight presence of death. (Student). That's the way a good many take it. Perfectly possible.
