

thanked the Lord for what we were accomplishing during that year and said that even if there should be no further year after that our activity and effort would have been ~~well~~ worth while, but in most matters I had a free rein, well, in many regards following the practice of Princeton and of Westminster to make such changes as seemed wise.

One point that seemed to me rather vital was the matter of husbanding of our resources so as to accomplish the most that we could with the time and energy and money funds that might be available to us. Church history was then two hours a week through two years. There It was certainly possible for every student to get the material to get the two years somewhere in the course of his three years in the seminary. There was no need of teaching it both of these courses or even one of them every year. Thus time and money ~~could~~ could be saved, and there would be no diminution whatever in the effectiveness of the work. During the first few years I alternated prophets and poets, since it really made no difference which of them students would take in their second year and which in their third year. Thus time and money were saved and the Lord's the resources the Lord made available ^{made} makes available to us could go further.

There are some courses in which small classes may be necessary, such as language courses in which there is a good deal of individual discussion, of exegetical matters, or courses in public speaking, and homiletics. In lecture courses there is no need of repeating the lecture courses every year. With the amount very close budget that we have at Biblical, and the great need of more money for advertising and other purposes, and the hope of enlarging our faculty, it seems to me that we are wasting that there are courses which it is a waste of time and of expenditure to give every year. ON the other hand there are it is very important for the development of the faculty and for the that there constantly be new electives given. Students who are in residence ~~as~~ as much as five years should have the opportunity to take a wide spectrum of electives. At Faith we did not charge tuition, and practically all of our students took many more electives than were required. I am very glad that we now have the arrangement here that after a student has taken the six hours of required elective he can take as many others as he desires during his undergraduate(?) (i.e., undergraduate of the Seminary?) (all of course are college graduates--not un-ergraduates) course without having to pay
