

In the case of a man like Dr. Harris, whom I have known so well for so long a time, I cannot envision the possibility of his making any statement which would be proper ground for questioning the desirability of his continuance on our faculty. I feel that I know his essential views and attitudes too thoroughly to believe it possible that he would do anything which I would consider proper grounds for questioning his place on our faculty. He and I have disagreed in the past, and may do so in the future, but I am thoroughly convinced that his central viewpoint and outlook are squarely within the area of the purpose of the Seminary. In the case of men whom I have known only half as long or half as well as I have known Dr. Harris, I might find it necessary to question the desirability of their continuance, if they should do things that made it necessary. I hope and pray that such may never be the case.

I would like also at this time to deplore the charges against Dr. Carl McIntire, President of the Board of Directors of Faith Seminary, which are being spread by Modernists, and even by some misguided Evangelicals. I have known and loved Dr. McIntire for many years. We have often differed, and I have never hesitated to express my differences of opinion from him. Yet I have found myself often to be wrong and him to be right. God has given him a penetrating brain which sees further than most people do. Aside altogether from this, I would like to say that I have always found him to be a man of integrity and truthfulness, kindly and considerate, with a heart dedicated to advancing the Cause of Christ. God has given him remarkable gifts. Anything we can do that will result in the increase in the effectiveness of the use of those gifts, rather than in its hindrance is, in my opinion, a service to God.
