

x As we look at others we see very clearly the principle which Paul points out; strangely, indeed, most of us are utterly blind to it as related to ourselves. As we look at ourselves we see only nobility and uprightness. The capitalist thinks of labor as always looking for a chance to grab a larger share of the rewards of industry, and trying to get more pay for less work; it seldom occurs to him to wonder whether he himself is trying to seize too large a share and paying too little attention to the right of human beings. The labor leader thinks of ~~the~~ capital as seeking to grind human life beneath its heel without giving a fair return for labor, and seldom ~~pauses~~ pauses to wonder whether labor is ~~asking~~ asking more than its share, or failing properly to redog~~nize~~nize the merits of conscientious hard-working management and enterprise. Each can see the faults in the other, and the death which results all too often from them; but seldom indeed does one see clearly his own share in the blame.
