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I may put out the fleece, and that the fleece be wet and the ground dry." And after he had made this prayer that God would give him even one more sign, he says that he picked up a book by Thorn ? Chambers, "MY UTMOST FOR HIS HIGHEST," a book which has Scripture readings and discussions for each day. He turned to the reading for that day, which was November 12. He found that it was a discussion of the text, "Now the Lord had said unto Abram, 'Get thee out of thy country and from thy kindred!'" and continued to say that Abram had been ordered to obey God, to go out and leave his kindred, to go where God would lead him, and how it was necessary when God led to step out and not be deterred by such considerations as those of flesh and blood, a very strong statement on the duty of absolute consecration to God in such a regard as this given on that particular day on which he turned to see what the discussion was in this book.

Immediately thereafter, Mr. B. stated that he considered it unusual that God leads in this way. He does not think we have a right ordinarily to look to God for such leading, but that he thought that very frequently at important crises in our lives, God does so. At any rate, here were two striking instances, one in the life of Dr. Chisholm, and the other in his own life, in connection with these vital steps which they have taken.
